BIBLE STUDY TO THE MASSES!

It's been a privilege to be entrusted with the task of leading the Bible Study at Youth Camp and all the TREK weeks for the last 3 summers. I've been asked to share a bit about how I develop the content of those Bible Study sessions and how I see the campers react to what they hear.

First, my primary goal is to clearly present the gospel in a way that connects with the various age groups. Yes, the camp pastor will share the gospel at least once during the week, but the reason the Church and Camp Copass exists is because you can never have too much gospel. I do my best to get to Jesus as quickly as possible.

Second, I want to connect the dots between the theme for the year and how it fits into the lives of the campers. For example, with the theme "Love your Selfie" I wanted to be clear that Jesus isn't calling us to put ourselves above everyone else. In fact, Jesus calls us to do the exact opposite all while trusting that He will take care of us. With that in mind, the Holy Spirit led me to focus on three different "selfies" we see in Scripture: The perfect selfie of Adam and Eve and their original relationship with God, the bestie selfie of Jesus as our best friend who always tells us the truth and gave himself up for us, and the group selfie of being a part of the Church that enables us to worship and grow together.

Last, I want to keep it fairly simple. doesn't Now, simple mean dumbed-down. It just means I make every effort to avoid the temptation to teach 2700 campers into submission. It's important for hearers of all ages to understand that the gospel is intended to bring about real life change in this life. They won't grasp this really if they can't understand or aren't interested in what is being said. I've learned that Jesus has a pretty amazing track record of doing supernatural things with simple offerings.

As I taught the different lessons this past summer, the campers were amazing in their responses and really took an active part in explaining to those who did not understand or those who did not truly know the Lord. Watching them put two and two together and come up with four is what all the preparations and prayer is about. Praise the Lord for His Word that is current today and every day.

I'd like to thank Carla and Brad for the chance to be a part of what God is doing through Camp Copass.
